Holy Martyrs Carpus and Papyrus

Carpus was the son of pagan parents. He converted and eventually became the Bishop of Pergamum. Papyrus came from neighboring Thyatira. He was converted by Carpus, instructed by him, and eventually served as his deacon. They were both arrested during the persecution of Decius by order of the governor. After fearlessly confessing Christ, bishop and deacon were punished by being harnessed behind horses and forced to run forty miles to Sardis. There were tied up and flayed. When asked by their tormentors how they still endured with serenity, Carpus replied, "I have seen the glory of the Lord." The two suffered martyrdom for their Lord in about 250 and so entered the Kingdom.
